It may look like something from the future, but China's long-awaited "straddling bus" ran its inaugural test in Hebei province this week. The two-meter-high Transit Elevated Bus (TEB) straddles the cars below, allowing them to pass through. 31 electricity, the bus is able to carry up to 300 passengers in its 72-foot long and 25-foot wide body.

A video of a mini-model of the vehicle caused great excitement when it was released in May.

The trial run was conducted on a 300-meter-long controlled track in the north-eastern city of Qinhaungdao. The vehicle is expected to reach speeds of up to 60 kilometers per hour, running on rails 32 along ordinary roads. Up to four TEBs can be linked together.

The biggest advantage is that the bus will save lots of road space. The TEB has the same functions as the subway, **33** its cost of construction is less than one fifth of that of the subway. One TEB could replace 40 conventional buses, according to the firm. 34, it is unclear when the vehicle will be widely used in Chinese cities.

It is not a new idea, but it was not seriously considered <u>35</u> a mini-model of it was launched at the 19th China Beijing International High-Tech Expo in May. A month later, developers announced that the TEB would be ready for a test-run in August. Thousands took to micro-blogging site Weibo to express their amazement and incredulity. "This is truly built at 'Chinese speed." "I swear I just saw ideas of this in pictures. Now it's appeared in real life," said another.

#### 第一篇:

While online gaming has become a favorite pastime of millions of people, researchers are investigating how gaming can improve work performance. Studies in the medical field show that surgeons who play video games using a joystick improve their hand-eye coordination, resulting in 37 percent fewer errors during real-life surgery. Other interactive software allows doctors to perform simulated surgery on avatars, providing practice time before operating on actual patients.

In the workplace, companies have developed performance games that run behind-the-scenes on employee's computers. The games award points for tasks such as being on time for work, attending meetings, and finishing segments of projects. This reward-based type of gaming triggers the release of dopamine in the brain, raising performance levels and production. Other companies have discovered that linking video games with audio instructions raises retention levels of employees. Skills are then acquired more quickly.

IBM has placed Innov8, a business game, at over 1,000 universities. Students participate in real-time business models that provide immediate feedback on the decisions they make. This interactive education tool enhances book learning and lectures by allowing students to apply learned material. Decision-making skills are improved, as students learn by trial and error, and strengthen analytical skills.

Some communities have decided to base evaluations of teachers on students' test scores. It will be these First of all, if teachers' salaries are going to be based on how much students learn, then some teachers will start

evaluations that determine how much teachers will be paid. I don't think this is a very good idea for several reasons. to teach their students only what they need to get high test scores. This means that students will miss out on a lot of education that can't be measured on a test. For instance, one of the best methods to help students understand a subject is encouraging them to discuss it. A common practice is to divide the class into groups, have each group discuss the subject, and then have them report back to the whole class. This kind of shared learning can lead to a full understanding. It also teaches students how to discuss and debate ideas. However, it doesn't supply facts to show off on a test.

Another problem with basing teachers' salaries on how much their students learn is that teachers may ignore students who have learning difficulties. Some students are slower learners than others and need more individual attention. If a teacher is worried about tests, he may feel he has to push the majority of the students to cram facts. That effort will take all his time. He won't be able to help the less able students.

It's true that there are teachers who experience "burnout" after many years teaching and just don't care how much their students learn. Basing their salaries on their students' test scores may improve their efforts. However, it's not fair for the majority of teachers. They deserve and need to be judged by other criteria.
