The world is changing and people are going to have to learn to get along. Being exposed to and building relationships with people who look different can help us to have better attitudes and be more positive about other races and cultures. In 2017, researchers from UCLA published research showing a wide range of personal and social benefits for students of all races and ethnicities from attending ethnically diverse schools. The study found that middle school students from a range of racial and ethnic backgrounds feel safer, less lonely and less bullied if they attend schools that are more diverse. The study also found that students in diverse schools—those with multiple ethnic groups of relatively equal size—reported more tolerance and less prejudice toward students of other ethnicities and believe teachers treat all students more fairly and equally.

Underscoring the importance of these findings, the study's authors point out that the nation's population has become significantly more diverse and will become even more so. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, as of 2015 more than half of school-age youth in the United States were ethnic minority. By 2040 White students will no longer be the majority in our nation's public schools. Yet today, U.S. schools have become more segregated than at any time in the past 40 years. Immigration is changing everything. We need to realize it is in everybody's interest for schools and classrooms to be more racially diverse. Diversity enhances learning because divergent points of view challenge students 'own beliefs.
